CFPR LUNCHTIME SEMINAR SERIES 2018

FAMILY AND POPULATION CHANCES IN SINCAPORE

This seminar presents an overview of the historical origins and contemporary transformations of Singapore families and population. Utilizing a variety of data sources including historical records, ethnographic studies, censuses and official statistics, we show trends in migration, age and gender compositions, fertility and parenthood, marriage patterns, inter-ethnic and transnational family formation, diverse family forms and household structures, and family attitudes and ideals for the three officially designated ethnic groups - Chinese, Malays, and Indians. In light of major theoretical frameworks for global family changes, Singapore constitutes a unique case due to its historical, cultural, and institutional setups. We highlight critical public policies that help shape the family and population changes and identify challenges these changes pose for Singapore's future development.

Dr Shu Hu is currently a joint research fellow at the Asia Research Institute and the Centre for Family and Population Research (CFPR). She is a family sociologist and her research interests center on how family origin, gender, and the state shape the lives and wellbeing of individuals at different stages of the life course. She received her PhD in Sociology from National University of Singapore in 2015. Her research during graduate school focused on parental labor migration and adolescents' transition to high school in rural China. She has also done research on transition to adulthood of young people, and changes and continuities of marriage values in China. She has published in *Social Indicators Research,The Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science* and *Chinese Journal of Sociology*.

The current presentation will be based on the first two chapters of the edited book entitled "Family and Population Changes in Singapore: A Unique Case in the Global Family Change".
