MARRIAGE TRENDS IN SINGAPORE AND CHINA: WHAT ISSUES SHOULD WE BE FOCUSING ON?

The long-term rise in singlehood in Singapore appears to have largely run its course, unlike the situation in other East Asian countries. A number of likely reasons for this will be discussed. Perhaps the more important issue at present is the rise in inter-ethnic and crossborder marriages, and what this implies for the traditional categorizations of ethnicity in Singapore. Turning to China, marriage delay into the 30s is now increasing. Different socioeconomic groups of women and men face sharply divergent marriage prospects: an overall excess of males, especially rural males with low education, and sharply changing ratios of women to men with higher education. The projected imbalance in numbers of potential marriage partners will play a major role in changing marriage patterns. It needs to be studied for specific geographical areas, educational and social groups. To what extent will spouse-pairing patterns change in response to these imbalances?



Gavin Jones is Emeritus Professor at the Australian National University. He is back in NUS as a Visiting Senior Research Fellow in ARI, having previously worked for 11 years at NUS. After working for the Population Council in New York, then in Thailand and Indonesia, he was with the Demography and Sociology Program at the Australian National University for 28 years, serving as head of program for an eight-year period. Professor Jones has conducted research on varied subjects in the field of demography and human resource development. He has served as consultant to many international agencies. He was Founding Editor of the journal Asian Population Studies.
