Centering Singlehood in Family Research

Roughly 40% of U.S. adults are single, meaning they are unmarried and not living with a cohabiting partner. Singlehood levels have risen in recent decades, reflecting the retreat from marriage and growing acceptance of other living arrangement configurations, such as solo living. Nonetheless, researchers have been slow to investigate singlehood, which remains obscured by an entrenched scholarly focus on union transitions and couplehood. The overarching goal of my presentation is to demonstrate why researchers should move singlehood from the margins to the center. I begin by describing demographic trends in singlehood. Then, I discuss novel theoretical developments in singlehood research, drawing on a forthcoming special issue of Journal of Family Theory and Review on singlehood for which I am coguest editor. Next, I share some preliminary findings on midlife single adults from newly collected data. Finally, I conclude with a call to action about next steps in this research area.
