The *Otagaisama* (reciprocal) community project aims to integrate local residents with private corporations and local government and organizations, empowering citizens with a new sense of awareness in building a sustainable community.

The *Otagaisama* community tool is designed out of Japan's urgent needs for a new social innovation to resolve the dysfunction of communities in Japan today affected by over-differentiation, super-aging and depopulation. An innovation from the project team "Community Design for Functional Integration in 2030", the team has now successfully implemented the tool in three communities in the Fukuoka area.



The *Otagaisama* project team will, for the first time, share the tool for use in another Asian context. How can the design benefit Singapore communities who are concerned with rebuilding the *kampung* spirit, and generational integration?

He is Founder of the Active Aging Consortium Asia Pacific, which includes members from Japan, Singapore and Australia, to look into promoting active aging strategies. He is also Founder and President of the Asian Aging Business Centre, a non-profit which looks at collaboration between the academic, businesses and local governments to uncover new business incubation to ageing challenges in Asia.
