

## **Mentoring on Implementation Research for Social Services Jan – Apr 2019**

### **Programme Description**

This 13-week mentoring programme on implementation research offers social service professionals an opportunity to complete a small-scale research project to study the implementation of a programme, a policy or an intervention.

Implementation research studies any aspect of implementation, for example, the factors affecting implementation, the processes of implementation, and the outcomes of implementation, including how to disseminate and scale up a programme, a policy or an intervention. The intent of the research seeks to understand what, why, and how programmes, policies or interventions work in real world settings and to work towards improving them.

Participants in this programme will be supported by training workshops, peer group discussions and regular feedback from experienced researcher-mentors. Throughout the programme, social service professionals will be guided from the conceptualisation of the research study to data collection, data-analysis and presentation of their research findings for their implementation research project.

While the workshops and mentors may provide support on specific research methods or skills, these would tailor towards the needs and requirements of the research projects proposed. The programme strives to provide a holistic guidance and support on the different stages of research for each proposed research project.

### **Programme Objectives**

At the end of the programme, participants are expected to achieve the following objectives:

- Conceptualise and complete a small-scale research project to study the design and implementation of a programme, a policy or an intervention independently
- Apply theories and concepts from the implementation research literature to the study
- Present and apply research findings at work

### **Programme Requirements**

All participants are required to:

- Conceptualise and complete a research project, either individually or in small groups
- Submit two assignments to the mentors for comments
- Attend and contribute actively during the workshops and mentoring sessions.
- Present research findings on programme graduation day. The presentation will be attended by participants and invited guests only.

Participants will be organized in small groups of 3 members each, where they will arrange with their mentors on suitable times to meet. Each mentoring session will last about 2 hours and the discussions may take place mainly through face-to-face meetings.

## **Programme Expectations**

Other than fulfilling the programme requirements stated above, participants will need to prepare for their research proposals, conduct library research, collect data, perform data-analyses, write reports and prepare for their conference presentations. A large part of the learning from this programme will come from mutual sharing of their research progress among the participants. Participants must be prepared to share their research progress with their mentors and with other participants.

## **Continuing Professional Education (CPE) Credits**

Aligned with the objectives of SkillsFuture and the National Social Work Competency Framework, participants will receive a Certificate of Participation for attendance and submission of two required assignments

Course participants are eligible for Continuing Professional Education (CPE) credits with the Singapore Association of Social Workers (SASW). One CPE credit will be awarded for each contact hour. Approval of CPE credits are to be submitted through the CPE Log Book under each accredited professional's account.

## **Target Programme Participants**

The programme welcomes all participants working in the social service or health sectors, who have a strong interest in implementation research. Participants should have at least a Bachelor's degree in any discipline and basic knowledge on social research. In particular, the programme is targeted at:

- Social workers
- Medical social workers
- Allied health professionals
- Social service practitioners and professionals from government agencies or voluntary welfare organisations

## **Registration Requirement**

Interested applicants must submit a brief research proposal, using the attached template. The proposal needs to state clearly the research topic and objective, the significance of the study and tentative research methods. Please use the template provided in the registration form.

## **Programme Materials**

All necessary programme materials will be provided.

## **Programme Structure**

The research mentoring programme is conducted over 13 weeks. The sessions include 2 full-day workshops, 6 small-group discussions with mentors and one full-day graduation presentation.

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**Programme Fees**

The programme fees are \$4,280 (including GST) per participant.

This course is **SSG-approved**. Participants who are **Singaporeans or Singaporean Permanent Residents** will be eligible for 70% of the course fees, excluding GST. **Singaporean participants who are aged 40 years old** and above will be eligible for higher subsidies of up to 90% of course fees.
