


# 1. Background of the Fund

### Background of the Fund About Mrs Lee Choon Guan



- NUS Department of Social Work is honoured to have received a gift by the Mrs Lee Choon Guan Trust to establish an endowed NUS Social Work Practice Research Fund
- Mrs Lee founded the Chinese Women's Association in 1915
- She was awarded the Member of the British Empire (MBE) for her contributions to the Red Cross during World War I



 She was a patron of the Po Leung Kuk, Board Member of the Singapore Chinese Girls' School and Children's Aid Society

### Background of the Fund Background & Objectives



- This fund resources the Department to engage with frontline practitioners to conduct practice research that will enhance service provision and delivery.
- The objective is to produce research for practice and turn it into teaching, training and intervention materials.
- These practice research projects have the potential to:
  - (1) improve the accessibility, delivery and design of services,
  - (2) enhance the well-being of service users
  - (3) contribute to policy discussions at the agency and governmental levels.



# 3. What is Practice Research and what is not?

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not Research and what is not

- Practice Research is increasingly viewed as a meeting point between practice and research that needs to be negotiated every time and everywhere it is established rather than a specific research method
- Goals of Practice Research include:
  - A research that describes, analyses and develops practice
  - A process where curiosity, critical reflection and critical thinking from researchers, practitioners and service users are in focus
  - A close, binding, committed and locally based collaboration between researchers/research settings and practitioner/practice settings in the planning, generating and disseminating of research
  - A participatory and dialogue-based research process relevant for developing practice and validating different expertise within the partnership

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.1 The Substantive Topic

- Research proposals, for example, should seek to:
  - Understand/explain or promote good practice in social work/social care organisations, programmes and/or management
  - Understand/evaluate/strengthen social work/social care services, including the voluntary/independent sector
  - Understand/promote the nature and quality of informal care, carer activity, volunteering and their relationship to formal care
  - Understand/assess/strengthen user/carer/citizen/community involvement in social work; community organisation, partnership; empowerment

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.1 The Substantive Topic

- Research proposals, for example, are much less likely to:
  - Demonstrate/assess the value of comparative, cross-national, cross-cultural research
  - Develop theorising as an end in its own right
  - Understand/appraise/develop the practice and quality of social work research
  - Understand/respond to issues about the form and significance of the family
  - Improve the policy, regulatory or inspection communities

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.2 The Methodology

- This is partly a question of feasibility within the scale and expertise resources of the research team.
- Hence, some forms of longitudinal qualitative research are unlikely to fit the terms of the grant, as are most applications of randomized control designs.
- Also, research or evaluation designs that require very high levels of, for example, analysis capacity or expertise may not be feasible.

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.2 The Methodology

- In addition, this is partly a question of who are the intended research or evaluation study participants
- For example, a study that required a school survey of secondary school students, most of whom are not service users, may offer some implications for developmental programmes
- However, such a survey study tends to tap into service providers' expertise to a minimal extent and be conducted outside of the practice setting, and hence fall outside the terms of the LCG programme

## 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.3 The intended direct and indirect beneficiaries of the project

- As a general rule, the more that the beneficiaries are likely to be the direct and fairly short or at least medium-term beneficiaries of the proposed research, the closer the proposal will fit with the terms of the grant.
- The application of this criterion should be set out in the intended plans for the utilization and dissemination of the project results

### 3. What is Practice Research and what is not? 3.4 Strong Partnership and Participatory Nature of Singapore o

- A core element of Practice Research is the strong partnership between practitioner and researcher, where there are equally shared leadership, involvement and contribution.
- The participatory nature of Practice Research is highly valued and we hope to see the active and meaningful participation of different stakeholders, particularly from service providers, service users and their family members or caregivers in a collaborative effort to improve social service practice
