Programme Structure for students admitted from AY2019/20-AY2020/21

Objectives

The objective of the MSW programme is to produce the leaders of social work profession in direct practice, social policy and research, and social administration and development. Integrative learning, interdisciplinary exposure and innovative capacity building are the key pedagogical features of our MSW programme.

The MSW programme is designed to facilitate students' systematic integration of social work professional values and practice, theory and practice, and research and practice in every class. It also offers students interdisciplinary learning opportunities to take courses from other departments within the faculty as well as public policy, public health, and health sciences in other faculties and schools to their special interest. In our MSW programme, students can expect to build their innovative capacity of being future-ready social work professionals who are equipped with strong and distinct leadership quality and cross-sector mobility in the Singaporean social service sector.

With effect from AY2019/2020, students admitted into a government-subsidised graduate coursework programme who take longer than the normal candidature period to complete their degree requirements are required to pay full unsubsidised fees, during the extended semesters.

Programme Structure

A candidate for the degree of Master of Social Work must complete at least 40 MCs at level 5000 or 6000, excluding graduate diploma courses. SW5117A and SW5117B are capstone courses. Students without BSW are required to complete a practicum. Students without BSW or GDSW are required to complete foundation courses above 40 MCs.

Students with BSW:

• SW5117A, SW5117B; and

• 8 elective courses with at least a course from each of the 4 baskets of courses. <u>Students with Graduate Diploma in Social Work (GDSW):</u>

- SW5117A, SW5117B;
- SW5111B; and

• 7 elective courses with at least a course from each of the 4 baskets of courses. SW5111B requires 400 fieldwork hours and field supervision under an approved supervisor.

Students without BSW or GDSW:

- SW5113, SW5114, SW5115 and SW5116;
- SW5117A, SW5117B;
- SW5111A; and

• 7 elective courses with at least a course from each of the 4 baskets of courses. SW5113, SW5114, SW5115 and SW5116 are cross-listed with GDSW essential courses.

SW5111A requires 800 fieldwork hours and field supervision under an approved supervisor. Students are required to attend field integration seminars.

Note:

- 1. Not all elective courses are necessarily available in any one year.
- 2. Unless otherwise indicated, each course shall be of one semester's duration.
- 3. The programme structure and the courses offered may be modified from time to time.

Continuation Requirements

- Grade Point Average (GPA) should not fall below 2.50 for two consecutive semesters or 3.00 for three consecutive semesters. Termination of candidature will result if a student fails to maintain the minimum GPA as stipulated above. A student will be issued a warning for any semester in which his/her GPA falls below that required for graduation (3.00 for a Masters degree). If, in the following semester, the student's GPA again falls below the graduation requirement, but not sufficiently to warrant immediate termination, he/she will be placed on probation.
- With effect from AY2015/2016, where a course is required for the graduate candidature and the minimum grade is not met, a student may repeat:

(a) The same course (core or elective) only once. The improved grade point of the repeat/replaced course will replace the weaker one in the Grade Point Average (GPA) computation in the semester in which the successful attempt is made; and

(b) One-third of the curricular requirements not exceeding three courses, whichever is lower.
