Graduate Research Programme – Research Proposal Guidelines

The following is provided as a reference to help guide the preparation of your research proposal. Applicants are encouraged to adapt the structure and content to best present their proposed study.

Title of the study:

1. Introduction and Background

Provide a concise overview of the topic, including:

- Context and significance of the research problem.
- Brief review of key debates, concepts, or theories.
- The rationale for undertaking the study (why it matters academically and/or socially).

2. Research Problem, Objectives, and Hypotheses

Clearly state:

- The research problem or guiding issue.
- Research aim(s).
- Specific research objectives.
- Hypotheses (if applicable).

3. Literature Review (Brief)

Summarize relevant scholarly work (3–5 key themes). Demonstrate:

- What is already known about the topic.
- Gaps in the existing literature.
- How your proposed study will address these gaps.

(Use APA 7th in-text citations and include references at the end.)

4. Theoretical or Conceptual Framework

Outline the theoretical lens, framework, or model you will use to guide the research. Explain why this framework is suitable for the proposed study.

5. Methodology

Provide a tentative description of how you will conduct the research:

- Research Design (qualitative, quantitative, or mixed-methods).
- Population and Sampling (who will be studied, how participants will be selected).
- Data Collection Methods (e.g., surveys, interviews, archival data, secondary data).
- Data Analysis Plan (e.g., thematic analysis, regression, content analysis, statistical models).

(Mention ethical considerations relevant to your study.)

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6. Expected Contributions

Explain how your study will contribute to:

- Academic knowledge (theory, concepts, or methods).
- Social work/social science practice, policy, or service delivery.
