**Course Description**

The Southeast Asian economies and the region as a whole have experienced a significant change in their economic landscapes in terms of high growth rates, rising income levels, improvement in the standards of living, and the changing structures of production and trade. What accounts for this transformation? We seek to answer this question by examining the experiences and problems of the various Southeast Asian economies in the context of the leading development models and policies that they have pursued in promoting and developing their domestic sectors (agriculture, manufacturing and services) and external sectors (trade, foreign capital and regionalism).

• ***(i) Short MCQ Quizzes (15%):***

MCQ quizzes will be administered online during lectures using Canvas Quiz to determine the students' knowledge and understanding of relevant theories and concepts introduced in the lectures.

• ***(ii) Discussion Forum participation (20%):***

Students are also expected to contribute to the Discussion Forum created in Canvas by posting messages, questions, responses, and other information that are relevant to the module.

• ***(iii) Tutorial seminar presentation (30%):***

The size of each group depends on student number. Tutorials are held from Class 4 to Class 12. Students will present a pre-

assigned article available online from Library Resources link of this module. Students are strongly encouraged to conduct additional research including recent data and information to substantiate the assigned articles. Group presentations will be conducted for a max of 20 minutes each group followed by Q&A. Students will be required to analyse and discuss the following points in their presentation: (a) highlights of the assigned article, (b) author's arguments, (c) student's views, (d) a critique of the article, and (e) relevance to the country of origin or to a country students are familiar with.

- **(iv) Individual Research Paper (35%)**

Students can write on any topic covered in this module. However, they need to obtain the lecturer's approval on their chosen topic by submitting a 1-2 page outline indicating the research question, hypothesis/main argument, objectives of the paper, methodology, structure of the paper, and a list of sample references. Word limit: 2,250 words excluding footnotes and references. Deadline: Class 11
